RE: LAKE CUNNINGHAM FIRE DISTRICT

Honorable Chairman Tripp, Vice Chairman Seman, Finance Chairman Kirven and Greenville County Council:

The Lake Cunningham Fire District (the "District") was created pursuant to Act No. 1829 of the Acts and Joint Resolutions of the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina for the year 1972, as amended, (the "Act No. 1829") to provide fire protection services in an unincorporated portion of the County.

The District has 33 full-time firefighters, including a full-time Fire Chief and a Deputy Fire Chief, and five volunteer fire fighters. Of the 40 firefighters, 13 are EMTs.

The District's readiness and training meets a high standard for fire service provision, and we currently maintain an ISO rating of 2/2Y. In a district that continues to experience significant growth, we continue to look for the most cost-effective solutions to provide for increasing operational costs, replace outmoded equipment, and provide additional facilities. We strive to achieve continued improvement in employee performance through recruitment, training, and certification of both career and volunteer employees. The FY2024 operational and capital expenditures are projected at approximately \$4.5 million. The current operating millage for the District is 37.2 mils. The District does not currently have any outstanding debt.

Pursuant Act No. 1829, the District Board is authorized to annually levy, for operations and maintenance, ad valorem property tax millage not exceeding fifteen (15) mills. Furthermore, the provisions contained in the S.C. Code Sections 6-11-271 and 6-11-275, as amended, allow special purpose districts totally located within a county, which were in existence prior to March 7, 1973, and which have the statutory authority to annually levy taxes for operations and maintenance are authorized to modify their respective millage limitations provided the increase is first approved by the governing body of the district and by the governing body of the county in which the district by resolutions duly adopted. The District Board approved the increase of 28.8 mills in addition to the 15 mills millage limitation authorized by Act No. 1829, for a total millage of 43.8 mills, which represents a 6.6 mill increase from last year's ad valorem property tax millage levy.

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We would like to make you aware of the following:

- The District covers approximately 49.58 square miles and serves an estimated population 31,000 during the day and 40,800 at night.
- As faced by all fire districts, inflation has taken a significant toll on the District's operating and capital budgets.
- The District maintains By-laws, Purchasing Policies, Internal Controls Policies, and Credit Card Policies.
- The most important reason for these improvements is to improve upon the services that we provide our citizens.

Attached you will find a Five-Year Revenue and Expenditure Projection including a five-year Capital Improvement Plan; a Resolution adopted by the District Board in support of the Revenue and Expenditure Projections; the County Fire Application, and the FY23 Audit. Please review the attached information and let us know if you have any questions. Thank you for your continued support and consideration for the District.

- 1. Please describe any businesses or structures which require special equipment or represent potentially dangerous calls. The Lake Cunningham Fire District covers multiple potentially dangerous locations within its district. One location is the Hansen Rock Quarry which requires the training and use of specialized equipment in order to reach both an occupant in confined or high-angle locations. The depth of the quarry is over 400 feet from street level, plus the types of vehicles and equipment utilized by the quarry are large in size compared to our own vehicles. A second such location is the Greenville County Sherriff's Office Training Center. The center houses a building with an abundance of live ammunition and weapons for use during training and tactical events for the GCSO. Third, the Greer Water Treatment plant is also responded to by this agency. This location stores deadly and caustic solutions for the treatment of water purification. Finally, although not in our district, the Lake Cunningham FD surrounds the two largest bodies of water in Greenville County, Lakes Robinson and Cunningham. Our aid agreement with the City of Greer requires the specialized training of our personnel in advances water rescue and boat operations. Beginning in 2021, the Commission of Public works started to allow recreational swimming in the lakes, which has already led to additional call volume on the two bodies of water.
- 2. Please list any mutual aid agreements or operational or resource sharing agreements your district participates in with other fire districts. The Lake Cunningham Fire District has Automatic Mutual aid with all of our surrounding fire districts, including those in Spartanburg County. These districts are Gowensville, Glassy Mountain, Tigerville, N Greenville, Piedmont Park, Taylors, City of Greer, Tyger River, and Holly Springs. We are members of the Greenville County Mutual Aid Agreement and the South Carolina Mutual Aid Agreement. The LCFD is available at any time for mutual aid as requested.
- 3. Please describe how, if at all, the requested millage increase will impact your district's ISO ratings.
 Yes, Lake Cunningham has been in need of apparatus replacement, station remodels, and the construction of a new station on the East side of our district in the Jordan Rd area. With the increase we intend to utilize it in the beginning for capital expenses i.e. apparatus replacement, station remodels, etc. Then once the new station is constructed the revenue increase will be utilized for the staffing needs that come with it, which will improve the 2Y ISO area of our district which is essentially no protection according to ISO.
- 4. Please describe the tax-exempt properties in your district and the services you provide to these entities. LCFD has 31 religious' organizations, 2 high schools (Blue Ridge HS * Greer Middle Charter HS), 1 middle school (Blue Ridge Middle School), 1 elementary school (Skyland Elementary), and 1 Greenville Tech campus (Benson). Plus, the O'Neal Camp transfer station and County Roads & Bridges site, plus the Greenville County Sherriff's Office Training Counter are all legated within our district. The department provides the same services to these entities, along with fire prevention and fire safety program, as well as public education when required or requested.

A RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION FOR PURPOSES OF APPROVING A FIVE-YEAR REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE PLAN AND AN INCREASE TO THE MILLAGE LIMITATION ESTABLISHED FOR THE LAKE CUNNINGHAM FIRE DISTRICT AND TO REQUEST GREENVILLE COUNTY COUNCIL'S APPROVAL OF THE INCREASE OF THE MILLAGE LIMITATION.

WHEREAS, the Lake Cunningham Fire District (the "District") is a special purpose district, located wholly within Greenville County (the "County"); and

WHEREAS, the District was created by Act No 1829 of 1972, as amended, by the South Carolina General Assembly, which established the District's Board of Fire Control (the "Board") as the governing body for the District; and

WHEREAS, the District approves the five-year revenue and expenditure plan, including the capital improvement plan (the "Plan"), to adequately serve the needs of the residents of the District and respond to the growing demand for services in the District.

WHEREAS, the Board is an elected body authorized pursuant to Act No. 1829 of 1972, as amended, to annually levy, for operations and maintenance, ad valorem property tax millage not exceeding fifteen (15) mills; and

WHEREAS, according to the provisions contained in the S.C. Code Sections 6-11-271 and 6-11-275, as amended, special purpose districts totally located within a county, which were in existence prior to March 7, 1973, and which have the statutory authority to annually levy taxes for operations and maintenance are authorized to modify their respective millage limitations provided the increase is first approved by the governing body of the district and by the governing body of the county in which the district is located by resolutions duly adopted.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board approves the increase of twenty-eight point eight (28.8) mills in addition to the fifteen (15) mills millage limitation authorized by Act No. 1829 of 1972, for a total millage of forty-three point eight (43.8) mills, which represents a six point six (6.6) mill increase from last year's ad valorem property tax millage levy.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board requests that County Council approve the modification to the millage limitation authorized by law.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the millage increase authorized by this Resolution and effectuated pursuant to the provisions of S.C. Code Sections 6-11-271 and 6-11-275, as amended, is effective only for the tax year 2024-2025.
