 W. Wood of the State and District
 aforesaid in consideration of two Hundred
 Dollars to me in hand paid by John Macbeth
 of the District and State aforesaid, have
 granted bargained sold & released and
 by these presents do grant bargain sell
 and release unto John Macbeth one
 certain Lot of lands lying in the Village
 of Pleasantburg, at Greenville District
 Court House, No, 37, beginning on a Stake S. $7\frac{1}{2}$
 E. $11\frac{1}{2}$ Feet to a Stake 37, thence S. $15\frac{1}{2}$ W. 140 -
 Feet to a Stake 37, thence N. $7\frac{1}{2}$ W. $11\frac{1}{2}$ Feet -
 to a Stake thence N. $15\frac{1}{2}$ E. 140 feet to the beginning
 supposed to contain one half acre, be the
 same more or less - Agreeable to the Chart of
 said Village, reference therunto
 made, may more fully appear at large appear
 Together with all and singular the rights
 members hereditaments and appurtenances,
 to the said premises belonging or in any wise
 incident or appertaining to have and to hold
 all and singular the premises before mentioned,
 unto the said John Macbeth his heirs and
 assigns forever and I do hereby bind my
 self my heirs Executors and administrators,
 to warrant and forever defend all and
