Alexander Administrators of the Estate of David Peden deceased late of the State and District of aforesaid in conformity with an order of the Court of common pleas for Greenville District in consideration of Three hundred and one dollars to us paid by William Harrison of the State and District of aforesaid have granted bargained sold and released and by these presents do grant bargain sell and release unto the said William Harrison a certain tract or parcel of land containing one hundred and sixty acres with a Mill thereon situate in Greenville District and State aforesaid on the waters of Bay Baurms creek being part of a tract of Land granted to David Peden containing nine hundred and ten acres granted by his excellency Charles Pinckney the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of March 1792 Beginning at a stone on the widow Peden's land running thence N. 60 E. 26 ch to a post Oak & thence N. 50 E. 46 ch to a white oak & thence N. 13 ch to a pine & thence E. 21 ch to a red oak & thence S. 65 W. 36 ch crossing the creek to a Sowerwood & thence S. 38 ch to the beginning together with the all and singular the rights members hereditaments and appurtenances to the premises belonging or in any wise incident or appertaining to have and to hold all and singular the premises before mentioned unto the said William Harrison his heirs and assigns for ever and we do hereby bind ourselves as Administrators of the Estate of David Peden deceased to warrant and forever defend all and singular the said premises unto the said William Harrison his heirs and assigns against ourselves and the heirs of David Peden deceased lawfully claiming or to claim the same or any part thereof Witness our hands and seals this twenty seventh day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand Eight hundred & twenty five and in the forty eighth year of American Independence Witness Present James Dunbar James Alexander Junr.
