

complete description of said property.
 The right to go through the timber and trees, on a line not to exceed one hundred feet (100) in width, the said timber and trees belonging, by virtue of certain timber leases to the said party of the first part; it being understood by the party of the second part that the same are now and have been possessed by others than the party of the first part.

Said tracts are situated in Cleveland Township, Greenville County, State of South Carolina and are more particularly described as follows:

Parcel i. The timber on that certain tract of land commonly known as the "Cleveland Tract", bounded on the north by the North Carolina line; on the east and south by lands now or formerly of Saluda Land and Lumber Company, et al. on the west by the North Carolina line and lands now or formerly of Saluda Land and Lumber Company. The timber on this tract having been conveyed, by J. H. Cleveland, et al. to the Saluda Corporation by deed bearing date of February 17, 1917, and recorded in the office of the Register in and for Greenville County, in Vol. 27, at page 5-22.

Parcel ii. The timber on that certain tract of land commonly known as the "McComb-Cooler Tract", lying on the waters of Middle Saluda River, bounded on the north west by lands now or formerly of J. N. & R. Mays Cleveland; bounded on the east by lands now or formerly of Mrs. Harriett D. Wilkins; designated "land described as tract J. N. & R. M. Cleveland, McComb-Cooler tract" on a plat thereof prepared by Howard Thimble, et al. 1921, reference to which plat is hereby made for a full and complete description of said property. The timber on this tract having been conveyed unto the said Saluda Land and Lumber Company by deed dated March 12, 1921, and recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds in and for Greenville County, in Vol. 61, at page 145.

Parcel iii. The timber on that certain tract of land commonly known as the "Harriett D. Wilkins tract", lying and being on the waters of Middle Saluda River bounded on the north by lands now or formerly of J. N.

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J. H. Cleveland, et al. on the west by lands now or formerly of Hagood, et al; on the south by lands of Saluda Land and Lumber Company, et al; and on the east and south by the middle Saluda River. This tract is described by metes and bounds in a timber deed from Harriett D. Wilkins to Saluda Land and Lumber Company, dated February 14th, 1920, and recorded in the Register's Office in and for Greenville County, in Vol. 61, at page 96 et seq. reference to which description is hereby made for a full and complete description of said property.

The right to construct and maintain, in a proper manner, in, upon, and through the above described lands, timber and trees, two lines, and structures of wood and, or steel, with poles, towers, wires and other necessary apparatus and appliances for the purpose of transmitting power by electricity, and supporting telephone wires; said lines to follow the course as best made a cross the above tract, said lines being familiar to both party of the first part and party of the second part; to enter line for the erection of the first of said two lines of structures having been heretofore surveyed, marked and staked out on the above described premises, and with the understanding that the center line of the second of the herein described lines and structures is to be located sixty (60) feet therefrom more or less, and on the south side thereof a running approximately parallel with, and sixty feet distant from the herein described first line of structures, together with the right, at all times, to enter upon said premises for the purpose of inspecting said line and making necessary repairs and alterations thereon.

The above described lines to be constructed of either towers or poles which may be changed from time to time and from one to the other at the option of the party of the second part, with the right to make changes, alterations and substitutions in said lines of structures as the party of the second part may deem advisable and expedient, together with the right to keep said right of way clear of all structures.
