TO ALL WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

I, E. Suman  
Master in and for the County aforesaid, SEND GREETING:  
Whereas, Nannie D. Suman

on or about the 11th day of April in the year of  
our Lord nineteen hundred and thirty-four exhibited her complaint in the  
Court of Common Pleas, for the County aforesaid, against Lula Moon, by her Guardian  
ad litem, J. E. Colvin, Jr.

demanding relief as to the real estate described in the complaint: and the cause being at issue, came on to be heard on the 15th  
day of February 1935, and such proceedings were had therein as resulted in a decree of the said Court, whereby it was  
adjudged and decreed that the said real estate hereinafter mentioned and described, be conveyed by E. Suman  
Master in and for the County aforesaid, to Shelma Nixon Bishop  
for the purposes mentioned in the said decree, as by reference thereto on file in said Court, will appear; (See Judgment Roll No.         )

NOW, Therefore, Know all Men by these Presents, that I, E. Suman  
Master, in and for the County of Greenville aforesaid, by virtue of the aforesaid decree, and upon receipt of \$800.00

HAVE GRANTED, conveyed and released, and by these presents, DO GRANT, convey and release unto the said  
Shelma Nixon Bishop

All that certain piece, parcel or tract of land in  
the County of Greenville, State of South Carolina, about one  
and one-half mile from Greenville County Court  
House on McDaniel Avenue, adjoining lands formerly  
owned by Greenville Cotton Mills and having the  
following meter and bounds, to-wit:

Beginning at an iron pin on the southwest  
corner of land formerly owned by Greenville  
Cotton Mills and running thence S 69° E. 150 feet  
to an iron pin; thence S. 7 1/2 W. 50 feet to an iron  
pin; thence N. 69° W. 150 feet to an iron pin on  
the road on McDaniel Ave; thence N. 7 1/2 E. 50 feet  
along said road on McDaniel Ave. to the beginning  
corner.

The above is the same conveyed to James Moon  
and Mary Moon by John H. Williams by his deed  
dated March 11, 1911 and recorded in Deed Book 11,  
page 176, R.M.C. Office for Greenville County. The said  
James Moon subsequently conveyed his interest  
to his second wife, Lula Moon. James Moon  
and Mary Moon both died intestate, leaving  
one child, George Moon, and his interest was  
sold by the sheriff of Greenville County, as will be  
shown by reference to Judgment Roll E-2552,  
Clerk of Courts office for Greenville County,  
to Nannie D. Suman by deed dated April 11,  
1934."
