


his bond to repay the same without interest in one, two

Item. To William and Charles Polk, the brothers  
of my wife Mary Brown, I leave ten guineas, to each  
to purchase a suit of clothes.

Appoint my beloved wife Mary Brown Executrix  
and my friends Benjamin Birnham & Richard  
Lord Champion Executors of this my last will and  
testament. I caution them against paying debts  
claimed as due from my Estate, which may be barred  
by law, unless they of their own knowledge know  
them to be just —

I humbly commit my soul to the mercy of Almighty  
God, praying that he may forgive my faults in this  
World, whether my opinions of Religion have been or  
false, as I endeavored to form the best system I could.

Done, and executed as my last Will & Testament  
on the thirteenth day of November, One thousand eight  
hundred and two. Witness my hand and Seal  
Signed Sealed & declared as his  Daniel Brown  
last Will & Testament in our presence, the same being first  
read to him. David Ramsay, Cath. Cadwirth, Benj. Gray.

Mary Brown to Henry Henson Dickinson, was presented &

South Carolina. Know all men by these presents that I  
Mary Brown of the Town of Camden, and district of Kershaw  
in the State aforesaid, for and in consideration of Six hundred  
Dollars to me in hand paid by Henry Henson Dickinson of the same  
place aforesaid, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged,
