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him one tenth toward said land, but returned the due as above mentioned, & he returned to me the obligation for the cash and property I was to give him for the same; I therefore for the satisfaction of any it may concern hereby relinquish all right title or claim, I may be thought to have to the said Hugh M'Way or any other to whom he may have sold said land; Given under my hand and seal the 18<sup>th</sup> day of August 1818 8<sup>th</sup> of American Independence the 43<sup>rd</sup> Year —
