Johnson's line thence on said Johnson's line to a spanish oak corner, thence running on James Johnson's line to red oak, thence to a Hickory, thence to a small creek or branch of Enoree River, thence up the meanders of said branch to the mouth of first branch, thence up the meanders of said branch to a Poplar, thence to Hickory, thence to a white oak, thence up the meanders of the string branch running from W<sup>m</sup> Bates' Powell place to the beginning.
